DRIED TART CHERRY TRADE COMMITTEE LAWSUIT

A lawsuit was filed in April by the Dried Tart Cherry Trade Committee with the International Trade Commission. Recently there was some good news when the U.S. Department of Commerce issued a preliminary schedule for tariffs on importers of foreign tart cherries. Perhaps as early as this winter there could be final approval. There then would be tariffs imposed which would hopefully stop the flood of Turkish government-subsidized dried tart cherries coming into the U.S. from Turkey.

FUNDING FOR RESEARCH, EXTENSION & EDUCATION

There is quite a lot of vegetable research in progress these days. Zach Hayden of MSU is just wrapping up a Specialty Crop Block Grant (SCBG) sponsored by the Michigan Vegetable Council (MVC). It is titled "Optimizing Fall Cover Crop Fertility Management for Vegetable Cropping Systems." If you want to learn more about this and effects of nitrogen, Zach will be speaking during the onion, asparagus, and vine crop sessions at the Expo.

Two other SCBG are just finishing their first of two years. They are: "Developing integrated crop management and extension programming for Michigan table beet and turnip production" and "Optimizing Production of Processing Squash with Increase Quality and Disease Resistance."

The Michigan Onion Committee is currently involved in one SCBG called "Leaf Blight Decreases Michigan Onion Yields and May Increase Bulb Rot: New Approaches Are Needed." There is also a brand new USDA Specialty Crops Research Initiative which has been awarded nationwide to 24 researchers and totals \$4 million dollars of federal money. It is titled "Stop the rot: Combatting onion bacterial diseases with pathogenomic tools and enhanced management strategies."
