An Ag Tech Symposium was held on Thursday during the 2023 Expo. The event lasted the whole morning and throughout part of the afternoon. # EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S NOTES

What could potentially help alleviate labor costs? Perhaps ag tech could help. At Asparagus Research Day on March 7, a company known as Muddy Machines presented to the crowd. The company has an autonomous asparagus harvester which will have 5 prototypes working in a field in the UK in 2024. Alongside a commercial unit from abroad, locals in Oceana county are working on an autonomous unit of their own.

# LEGISLATIVE HAPPENINGS

The Michigan Vegetable Council has retained the services of Kelley Cawthorne to be the lobbying agent for the Michigan Vegetable Council and Michigan's vegetable industry. The board decided that it is time to make a strong effort to promote advocacy for Michigan's vegetable industry. The latest step towards improved advocacy is that the Michigan Vegetable Council is planning on hosting a legislative reception on March 20, 2024 at the offices of Kelley Cawthorne. The event will be past by the time this newsletter lands in mail and inboxes. As I write this, there are over 35 state representatives, senators, and staff on our RSVP list.

Michigan Congressman John Moolenaar introduced the Supporting Farm Operations Act (H.R. 7046), which will address the high labor costs facing Michigan farmers. The bill would freeze the wage rate for migrant farm workers, known as the Adverse Effect Wage Rate (AEWR) at the level that was established in 2023 until end of 2025. The cost of labor remains a major issue for many vegetable crops that involve hand harvesting and hand weeding.

For this growing season, Michigan legislators deepened the state's commitment to the long-standing Michigan Agricultural Surplus System; the new budget appropriates \$12 million for the program, compared to \$2 million a year earlier. This program is coordinated through the Food Bank. In the past the \$2 million went mostly towards purchasing surplus. The increase of 6x now means that the Food Bank will be buying more than just surplus and the
